

Maria worked with the National Citizenship programme and was instrumental in raising the aspirations of students from a whole variety of backgrounds.

This included setting up placements for Bosworth students to experience University during the summer break which led to many of them being the first in their family history to transition to University.

Maria's children Tom and Richard both attended our school and she was very proud of the support provided by our brilliant team of staff. I taught Richard Chemistry, and Maria was so proud of his successes, as any parent would be. Even recently, when I met Maria, she talked proudly of what her children were up to now.

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Great North Run

It was the Great North Run last weekend and Bosworth Academy's staff and student communities were represented.



First up was Year 8 student Ava D-I who completed the Great North Junior Run on Saturday 9 September for the third time. "I have done the Junior North Run before. It went fantastic. As this time was my personal best I am really proud of myself. I have done it for the past three years and I have done better every year. It was really hot but I managed to push through it. "Over the years the longest I took was 43 minutes but as of this year, I completed it in 28 minutes," said Ava. On Sunday 10 September Headteacher Mr

Brown completed the half marathon and he described it as an "incredible experience". "We faced record temperatures for the world's biggest half-marathon and towards the end of the race experienced a month's rainfall in about half an hour when the road became a river! "I found the second half of the run challenging as it was just so hard to cool down, I became unconcerned about beating Mo Farah or my finish time (1hr43min), and instead focused on reaching the finish line at South Shields beach. I must say a big thank you to everyone who sponsored me for the Teenage Cancer Trust charity. "My highlights included watching 102 year old

WWII veteran Bill Cooksey cross the finish line, and seeing Keith Roberts who is blind, complete the race untethered, with only his guide ringing bells for him to follow for 21.1km. In his interview with Gabby Logan he shared how he had at last felt true 'freedom'.

"It was also great to hear that Ava had completed the Junior North Run too!" said Mr Brown.

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Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last Week's Answer: 12 rows

There are a few ways of going about solving this puzzle. The most straightforward method is to add up rows until you get to 3216.


The first row must have 8×50 seats in it and the second 8×47 , the third 8×44 etc. To save time you may notice that the number of seats in each row are decreasing by 24 each time.

The table on the right keeps track of the total seats. It's clear to see there that we require **12** rows to get exactly 3216 seats.

This Week's Puzzle: Number of Edges


A cube has 12 edges and 8 vertices (corners).

Post 16 Presentations

Both presentations will be held in the Main Hall and we look forward to seeing you there.



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Free School Meals

Is your child eligible for Free School Meals?



If your child is **not currently** registered for Free School Meals and you receive any of the following benefits, your child may be able to get free school meals:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child receives Free School Meals, the cost of a meal deal will be added to your child's payment card each day, and this can be used to purchase canteen food.

Additionally, all students entitled to free school meals will receive GCSE texts and revision material at either a reduced cost or free of charge.

Post 16 students who were in receipt of free school meals in Year 11, may be eligible for bursary support at Post 16.

Previously Looked After Children

Schools are entitled to funding for children who were Previously Looked After (PLAC). Previously looked-after children are those who are no longer looked after by a local authority in England and Wales because they are the subject of an adoption, special guardianship or child arrangements order; or they were adopted from 'state care' outside England and Wales. 'State care' is care provided by a public authority, a religious organisation, or any other organisation whose sole or main purpose is to benefit society. If your child is in this category, we must add them to our school census data. Please can you contact Beth Ladkin bethl6@bosworthacademy.org.uk if your child has joined the school or you have not informed the school that they were Previously Looked After.



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Top Tips for SETTING BOUNDARIES AROUND GAMING

If your child loves video games, then you'll probably be aware that how long they spend gaming – and what they're actually playing – can occasionally become a source of concern or conflict. The UK's trade body for interactive entertainment, Ukie, has recently launched a campaign to promote safer and more responsible gaming among young people – with parents and carers helping by setting sensible and fair boundaries. Our guide has tips on key areas where you could agree some healthy ground rules for your child's gaming activity.

PROMOTE SAFER GAME CHOICES

Deciding which online games are OK – and which should be avoided – is tricky. Some titles allow children to cooperate or compete with strangers, which creates potential risks. Watching your child play online for a while could provide more insight into a particular game, while the parental controls on most consoles allow you to limit who can chat to your child or send them friend requests. Remind your child of the hazards around strangers online when you discuss this boundary with them.

ENCOURAGE REGULAR BREAKS

Help your child understand the need to take regular breaks, playing in shorter bursts rather than marathon sessions. Bear in mind that some games (such as role-playing games) require time investment from the player, while others (online team games, for example) can't be stopped or paused at a moment's notice. A quick break every hour or so is good practice, and you could suggest some things to do in these breaks, such as having a drink of water or getting some fresh air.

AGREE SPENDING LIMITS

There's no doubt that gaming can be expensive, and younger players often don't realise how much paying for digital items and subscriptions can add up to. Many young gamers love to buy new skins or upgrades for their character, so you could settle on a fixed amount that your child is allowed to spend on in-game items each week or month. This sort of boundary will not only help your child to manage their expectations but will also make you more aware of the price of these items.

DISCUSS AGE RATINGS

Children often ignore the age ratings on games – or are unaware they even exist. If you're happy with your child playing a particular game even though it's rated above their age, then establish that as a boundary: emphasise that you've made an exception, and talk about what age ratings mean and why they're important. You could add context to this boundary by browsing games' boxes together while shopping, discussing why some games might have earned certain age ratings.



FACTOR IN FRIENDS

If your child is a keen video gamer, the chances are that they'll have other gamers among their social circle, too. When friends visit, do they instantly dash to their console or computer? You could put boundaries in place before their guests arrive by agreeing on a length of gaming time. Bear in mind, though, that they may try to extend this once they're together. Try coming up with activities or challenges for them during screen breaks – if they join in, they earn a little extra time on their game.

ENJOY GAMING TOGETHER

Setting time aside to play video games together can be an enjoyable bonding exercise. Undeniably, some young gamers may be less enthusiastic about a parent or carer joining in, but it can be a productive way of encouraging them to share their hobby with you. Setting goals or tasks might be useful: if they love Minecraft, choose something to build together; if Fortnite's their favourite, ask to try out some of the fun game modes, like Prop Hunt, which don't require high skill levels.

TALK ABOUT EMOTIONS

Help your child to monitor their emotions as they play. Discuss what is (and isn't) an acceptable level of competitiveness to show while gaming. Are they allowed to trash talk other players, for example? Can they notice when they get angry if they lose? Do they think these emotions are healthy? Some games can provoke anger, but others can bring joy, humour and the thrill of overcoming a challenge. Try to steer your child towards games that tend to produce these more positive feelings.

BE PREPARED FOR TROLLS

A frequent problem when gaming online is other players who are deliberately troublesome. Make sure your child knows how to report and block someone who makes their experience a negative one. Between you, decide if or how they should deal with these online trolls. Talk about where your child's boundaries are in terms of what they think is acceptable: what behaviour by other users is merely frustrating, and what crosses the line to become upsetting or abusive.


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Book Recommendations


... which means finding a way to make sure he will eventually die.
