

On Wednesday, we attended the LiFE

Multi-Academy Trust Strategic Planning Day. Our Trust of 10 schools is committed to delivering high-quality, personalised, and well-rounded education for every student. Collaboration between our primary and secondary schools remains central to our shared success.

During the morning we heard an inspiring keynote from our CEO Chris Parkinson, who highlighted current challenges in education and the importance of collective support and student agency in helping our children to thrive. Jean Gross CBE, a national expert on tackling disadvantage, shared powerful strategies to engage learners, emphasising that building self-efficacy is just as vital as developing cognitive skills.

We then had the privilege of listening to a keynote from Chris Lubbe, who shared his 'Journey from Apartheid to Truth & Reconciliation'. His captivating narrative shared his own experiences, as a bodyguard for Nelson Mandela, through Mandela's delicate negotiations that paved the way for South Africa's inaugural democratic elections.

Next week a number of our staff, governors, and students will be involved in Bosworth's Strategic Planning Day as we prepare and innovate for Academic Year 2025/26.

On Thursday our Year 7 students played in the National league Grand Finals held at Nottingham Trent University Sports Centre. Schools made it through the group stages first, over the course of this academic year and have been in the knockout phase since March.



So to make it all the way is an achievement in itself, to be the last 4 schools remaining out of 40 schools who have been selected for this year's competition.

Our first match was a "final before the finals" with two schools facing each other providing a

thrilling entertainment for everyone watching this match.

Lots of fast breaks, drives to the basket, rebounds, blocks and great assists. Our students have put on a great performance, but Northampton School proved to be a tough opponent on the day, having 8 national league players in their roster. Final score was 44 - 31 to them.

In our next match for bronze, it was a very much one sided affair as our students have given a stellar performance, outplaying Christ The King school from Nottingham 50 - 14, to clinch that much deserved 3rd place.

Every single student showed maturity, knowledge and passion in today's finals, representing Bosworth Academy at the highest of levels and brightest of stages!

It has been an incredible year for P.E. department, enabling our students to reach their potential, giving them platform and pathway to keep pushing that bar higher with each performance.

County School Athletics

On Thursday 5th June we had six athletes racing at the County Schools' athletic event at Loughborough University. Jasmine S in the Junior



Girls 300m, Fiona P in the Intermediate Girls 200m, Ava M-L in the Intermediate Girls 100m, Millie P in the Junior Girls 1200m and sisters, Daisy and Rose G in the Intermediate Girls 1500m.

Ava ran a brilliant heat in the 100m to qualify for the final where she finished 3rd to claim the bronze medal.

Millie ran a sensational race in the 1200m, demonstrating expert tactics by

running the first 1050m at a nice steady pace and in 7th place before an explosive final 150m to pass the runners in front to take the bronze.

Daisy and Rose ran a brilliant 1500m and at the end were only separated by around 5m with Daisy taking the bronze and Rose finishing in 4th place.

Both ran a really well paced race but were just unable to catch the runners in first and second.

Having qualified for the 200m Intermediate Girls final, Fiona produced another excellent race to take the silver medal in second place. The rain was again falling so made the start and bend running increasingly difficult but Fiona coped very well with a stunning performance.

The final race of the day was Jasmine in the 300m Junior Girls final, having qualified earlier in the day in a very strong heat. Unfortunately Jasmine was affected by the wet track and slipped on the bend and came home in 6th place but did brilliantly well to make the final.

All the girls showed exceptional character and team work in what were difficult conditions in the rainy weather but they ran brilliantly and showed great support to one another throughout the day.



This half term, Year 10 students will be having a taste of the Bosworth Post-16 experience through optional master classes and personal statement workshops held in our Oaks Social and Study areas.





Exam Preparation – Effective Revision Strategies

Students at Bosworth Academy are developing ‘The Core Four’ - strategies designed to improve study skills for effective revision.

Some study strategies are more effective than others.

Click this [link](#) for a webinar, aimed at parents and carers, that discusses these study approaches in detail, and outlines ineffective strategies that students should avoid. There is lots of useful practical advice, based on the latest evidence from research, that parents/carers can use to support learning outside of the classroom. The strategies discussed are ideal for all students in Year 7-13, **particularly those in Year 11-13 who have upcoming exams.**

I recommend that you watch the webinar with your child, discuss their work in school and how they can implement the strategies at home in preparation for end of topic tests and exams.

Summary: How to create flash cards

- 1. Identify knowledge**
What are you creating flash cards on?
Do you have your knowledge organized?
Use your book to look at previous misconceptions from whole class feedback.
- 2. Colour coding**
Use different coloured flash cards for different topics. This helps with organization NOT recall.
- 3. Designing**
1 Question per flashcard. Making them concise and clear.
Use a one word prompt, so that you can recall as much as you can.
No extended answer questions. Number your flash cards for self quizzing.
- 4. Using**
Write your answers down, then check. Or say your answers out loud, this really clearly shows the gaps in your knowledge.
Do not just copy & re-read. Shuffle the cards each time you use them.
Use the Leitner system to use flash cards everyday.
- 5. Feedback**
How have you performed when you look back at your answers?
Is there anything you need to revisit in more detail?
Is your knowledge secure? If so, move on to applying knowledge in that area in specific extended exam questions.

Summary: Self Quizzing

- 1. Identify knowledge**
Identify knowledge/c content you wish to cover.
- 2. Review and create**
Spend around 5-10 minutes reviewing content (knowledge organisers/class notes/text book)
Create x10 questions on the content (if your teacher has not provided you with questions)
- 3. Cover and answer**
Cover up your knowledge and answer the questions from memory.
Take your time and where possible answer in full sentences.
- 4. Self mark & reflect**
Go back to the content and self mark your answers in purple pen.
Store some questions next time.
- 5. Next time**
Revisit the areas where there were gaps in knowledge, and include these same questions next time.

- Builds confidence
- Reduces exam anxiety and stress
- Improves grades

Summary: How to create a mind map

- 1. Identify knowledge**
Select a topic you wish to revise. Have your class notes/knowledge organisers ready.
- 2. Identify sub topics**
Place the main topic in the centre of your page and identify sub topics that will branch off.
- 3. Branch off**
Branch of your sub topics with further detail.
Try not to fill the page with too much writing.
- 4. Use images & colour**
Use images and colour to help topics stick into your memory.
- 5. Put it somewhere visible**
Place completed mind maps in places where you can see them frequently.

Summary: Brain dumps

- 1. Identify knowledge**
Identify the knowledge/topic area you want to cover.
- 2. Write it down**
Take a blank piece of paper/write board and write down everything you can remember about that topic. (with no prompts)
Give yourself a time limit (e.g. 10 minutes)
- 3. Organise information**
Once complete and you cannot remember any more use different colours to highlight/underline words in groups.
This categories/links information.
- 4. Check understanding**
Compare your brain dump to your K2 or book and check understanding.
Add any key information you have missed (key words) in a different colour.
- 5. Store and compare**
Keep your brain dump safe and revisit it.
Next time you attempt the same topic try and complete the same amount of information in a shorter period of time or add more information.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about EMOJIS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Emojis are more than playful expressions – they form a fast-evolving digital language that many adults struggle to decode. For young people, this ‘secret code’ is central to how they communicate identity, humour and emotions. With over 5 billion emojis sent daily on Facebook Messenger alone, understanding these symbols is key to engaging meaningfully with digital youth.

GENERATIONAL MISCOMMUNICATION

An emoji like 👍 (thumbs up emoji) might seem friendly to adults, but teens often interpret it as sarcastic or passive-aggressive. These differing interpretations can create confusion or unintended tension in cross-generational conversations.

SHIELDING BULLYING OR PEER PRESSURE

When embedded in emojis, mean-spirited jokes or exclusionary language can fly under the radar. Terms like ‘mid’ or ‘delulu’ may seem harmless, but they can be used to undermine peers in subtle ways.

RAPIDLY SHIFTING MEANINGS

Emoji meanings can change overnight. A person standing emoji (👤) once signified awkwardness but might now be repurposed for something entirely different. This ever-changing lexicon can leave adults in the dark and young people vulnerable to misunderstanding or misuse.

MASKING DISTRESS OR HARM

Some emojis are used to discreetly signal troubling behaviours. For instance, 🍂 (falling leaves emoji) or 💊 (pill emoji) might suggest drug use, while 🌸 (wilted flower emoji) could hint at emotional struggles. Such usage can obscure serious issues, making them harder for trusted adults to detect.

NORMALISING RISKY BEHAVIOURS

Emojis can make harmful actions seem light-hearted or fashionable. Strings like 🔥👤 (fire + ‘woozy’ face + pill emoji) may appear humorous but can reference partying, intoxication or dangerous challenges, which might otherwise raise red flags.

Advice for Parents & Educators

LEARN THE LINGO

Stay updated with emoji trends and definitions using resources like emojipedia.org or Urban Dictionary. Knowing current meanings builds confidence when engaging with young people and helps spot potential concerns early.



CREATE SAFE SPACES FOR DISCUSSION

Encourage casual chats about emojis, online slang, memes, or social media trends. Showing interest without judgement reassures young people that they can talk about their digital world openly and safely.



ASK, DON'T ASSUME

Approach unfamiliar emojis with curiosity rather than suspicion. A light-hearted “What does 🍷 (juice box emoji) mean these days?” can open conversation and show that you respect their knowledge.



PRIORITISE TRUST OVER SURVEILLANCE

While parental controls and monitoring tools can be useful, emotional safety matters most. Be someone children and young people feel they can come to – not just someone who’s watching them.



EMOJI CHEAT SHEET - The following slang terms and emojis are some common examples – please be aware this isn't an exhaustive list.

COMMON EMOJIS:

- 🤡 (Clown face) Foolishness or clowning around
- 😏 (Smiling face with smug expression) Over-affectionate or ‘simping’
- 😎 (Smiling face with sunglasses) Cool, stylish or ruthless
- 👁️ (Eyes) Watching drama unfold
- 😘 (Smiling face with hearts) Intense attraction or excitement
- 🐐 (Goat) Greatest of all time (G.O.A.T.)
- 🙄 (Rolling back of the head) Stone-faced, unbothered
- 💅 (Nails) Confidence, sassiness, or indifference
- 👑 (Crown) ‘Slaying’, as in doing great
- 🚩 (Triangular flag) Red flag; a warning sign about someone’s behaviour

POTENTIALLY CONCERNING EMOJIS

- 🍷 (Ear of corn) Slang for pornography (avoids censorship algorithms)
- 🌸 (Wilted flower) Often used to convey emotional struggle or sadness
- ❄️ (Snowflake, snowman, snow cloud) Can symbolise cocaine
- 🐍 (Snake) Can represent betrayal or being ‘two-faced’
- 🔑 (Key, lying face) Related to cocaine use
- 🔫 (Water pistol) Sometimes used to reference violence or self-harm
- 🍃 (Falling leaves, herb, maple leaf) Can symbolise cannabis
- ⚠️ (Warning) Used to emphasise drama, threats or emotional turmoil
- 💊 (Pill) May reference drug use or prescription misuse
- 🍜 (Steaming bowl) Refers to nudes (‘noods’ is an abbreviation of noodles)

Empathy Day

Why is empathy important?

Empathy is being able to experience and understand other people's feelings and points of view. It is a crucial life skill every child and young person deserves the chance to develop, and a force for social change. We are not born with a finite amount of empathy, and this skill can be developed at any time.



What is Empathy Day?

Empathy Day is a national event, which inspires children, young people, and families to develop their empathy superpower and put it into action to change the world.

By taking part in Empathy Day, children, young people and the wider school community will:

- Learn more about empathy and build specific empathy skills: perspective-taking, empathic listening, naming, and sharing emotions and social action.
- Experience empathy through rich encounters with books, authors and illustrators.
- Be inspired to drive change by putting empathy into action.

Empathy Day is underpinned by scientific research showing that we can all learn to be more empathetic, it's a learnable skill. Plus, research shows that books are a powerful tool – when young readers identify with book characters, they learn to see things from others' points of view (<http://empathylab.uk/research>).

When is Empathy Day 2025?

This year, Empathy Day is on Thursday 12th June, with run-up activity taking place from May.

What is the theme for Empathy Day 2025?

This year's theme is JUMP INTO SOMEONE ELSE'S STORY. When children jump into a book, they identify with the characters and learn to see things from another person's point of view, starting to develop their empathy skills.


