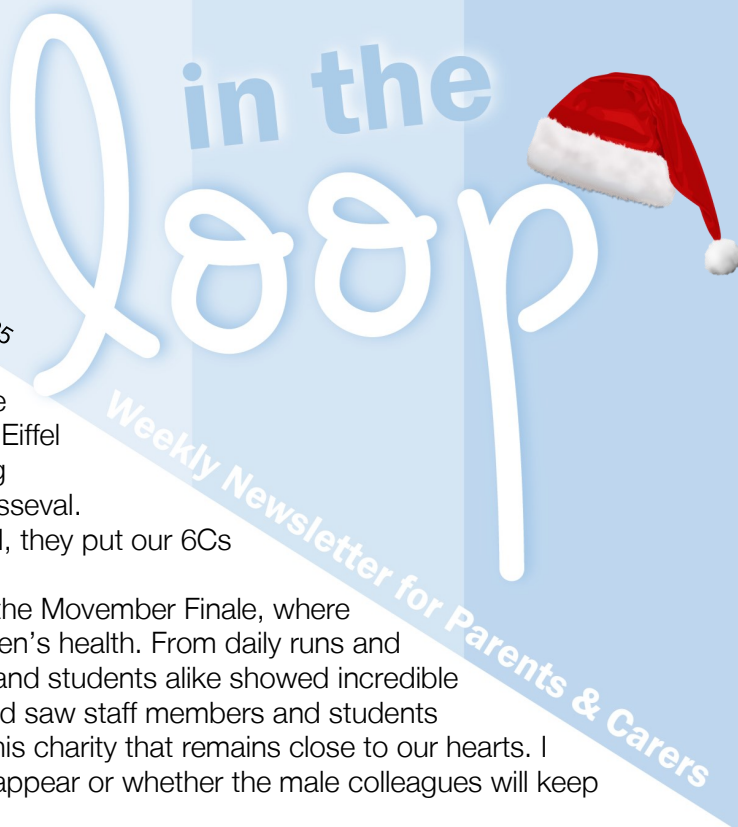




Welcome

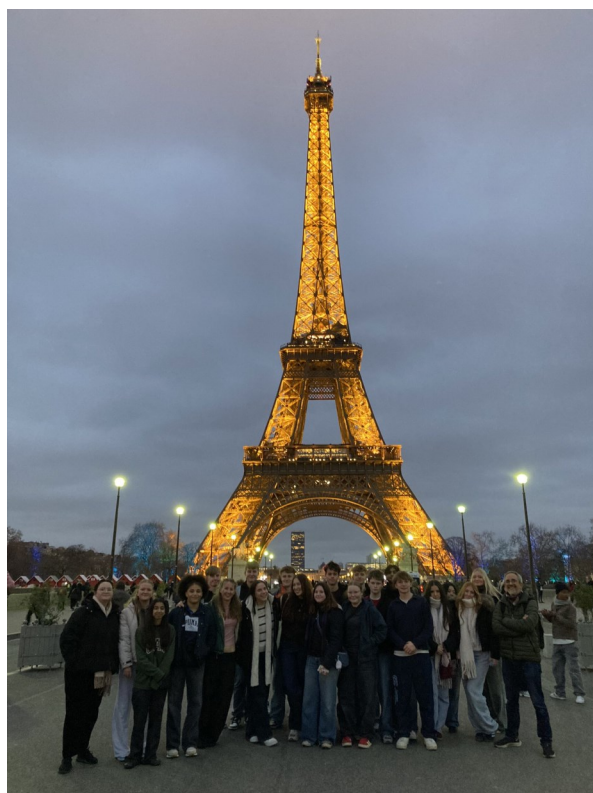

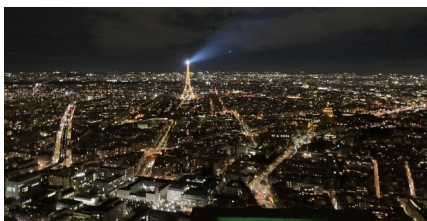

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P16 Languages Paris Trip

This week, 23 Post-16 students had the opportunity to visit **Paris**, the wonderful and vibrant European capital city, and one of the most visited in the world, with 48.7 million tourists last year. Our students became part of this statistic as they enjoyed discovering la Ville Lumière. They visited many of the city's most famous historical landmarks, including the **Louvre Pyramid**, the **Champs-Élysées**, the **Arc de Triomphe**, the **Eiffel Tower**, **Notre-Dame Cathedral**, and the **Château de Versailles**. We must not forget the **Montmartre** district, where art feels accessible to everyone and where many famous painters once lived. Our students learned a great deal about the history of these landmarks, buildings, and cultural features, as well as the reasons they are so significant to the city. They were also truly impressed by the architectural style and elegance of these remarkable edifices. In the evenings, the students also had the chance to experience Parisian nightlife by dining in a traditional brasserie and enjoying typical French dishes—another authentic cultural moment that they greatly appreciated. Talking about nightlife, it must be said that the students also had the wonderful opportunity to discover Paris by night from the top of the Montparnasse Tower. However, this trip was not only about sightseeing. It was also about **meeting people from Paris**—young people who share similar experiences and



challenges. Our students spent a whole day with a group of Year 12 French students from **le Lycée Carcado-Saisseval**. They spent the morning at the school, working together and putting our **6Cs principles into action**.

Communication and collaboration flowed naturally between the French and English students, creating a rich and memorable real-life learning experience. Together, they took part in ice-breaker activities and presented

their schools to each other in the target language of the host country. They then joined three discussion workshops based on their interests: **teenage life, diversity, and AI**. Each group created a poster to summarise their ideas and presented it to the whole class.

In the afternoon, the students explored Paris through a city rally—what better way to learn in a real-life setting filled with culture and history? It is also worth mentioning that the group navigated Paris **using the metro** and other public transport, which not only strengthened their independence but also allowed them to experience the daily life of local Parisians—les Parisiens dans leur vie de tous les jours. Movember page. We also have Movember pin badges, perfect for student lanyards available to purchase on iPay. Simply make the purchase and your child can collect from the Main Reception.

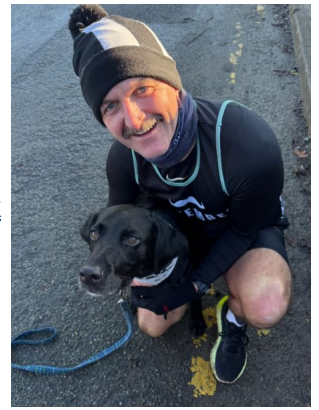

2025 Olympus Mons

On Saturday, 27th November, Post-16 students from Bosworth Academy—Amninder, Connor, Lily, Aimee, Toby, Shrey-Aj, Daniel S, Daniel A, Thomas B and Thomas C —participated in the Regional UK Space Design Competition, held at the University of Nottingham along with other local colleges.



During the 12-hour day, the students designed a space cargo ship to deliver materials through the inner solar system under the imaginary company, Olympus Mons Trading Company. The design process included developing a ship to transport large metal casks, devising transportation methods to distribute these casks across the inner solar system, organising staff housing and work rotas, planning living quarters and food production for the staff, and determining the energy source for the ship.

Throughout the day, they worked as a team to create detailed plans, hold planning meetings, and prepare a presentation of their ideas for judging. The students presented their ideas with clarity and confidence, answering the judges' questions in-depth. With great anticipation, they awaited the final results, but unfortunately they were not winners this year. Despite this the skills in communication, collaboration and creativity they developed during the day will be invaluable to them in the future. We were very proud of them.

Mitch Jackson Alumni Visit

Alumni Mitch Jackson, who completed his studies at Bosworth Academy in 2011, came in to deliver a wonderful talk on Wednesday regarding strength and conditioning. He is currently working with Chase Jackson, USA shot put record holder, currently ranked number 1 in the world. He is also involved in the training of 15 other Olympians. The first session was delivered to our A level PE students with link theory from the classroom to the real world of elite coaching.



This was followed up by a plyometric session in the sports hall. During the talk, Mitch shared his story of how his career went from A Level Physical Education at Bosworth Academy to a university degree in environmental sciences to then competing as Britain's Strongest Man and then as a strength and conditioning coach to elite athletes. Mitch shared some applied theoretical concepts that are taught on both at GCSE and A Level which really helped bring the learning from our classrooms to life.

Mitch was a real inspiration and a great example of how hard work and dedication can take an ordinary Bosworth Academy student to the very top of their sport both as a performer and then as a coach. It was a delight to see Mitch again and we all wish him and his wife, Chase, the very best in their careers.

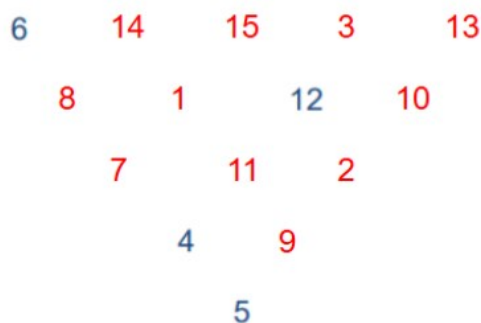


Maths Puzzle of the Week

Can you complete the triangle below?

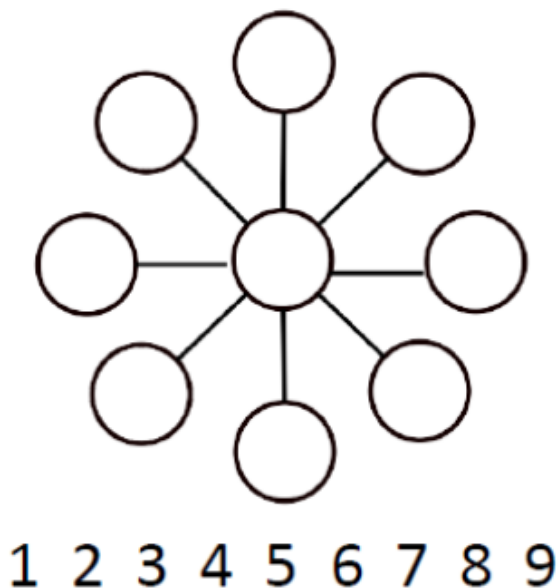


This week's puzzle: Magic Flower

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

ELECTRICAL SAFETY AND DEVICES

Electrical safety is a vital topic for parents and educators, especially with the growing use of devices like smartphones, laptops, and power banks. Electrical fires are a major risk and are the cause of many deaths and injuries each year. There are reportedly nearly 20,000 accidental fires of electrical origin each year in the UK. This guide offers practical advice to help families and schools prevent electrical hazards, and promote safety when using everyday devices.

1 CHECK FOR OVERHEATING

Devices such as laptops, tablets, and smartphones can overheat if used for long periods or when charging. Ensure that children don't use devices on soft surfaces like beds or sofas, which can block ventilation. If a device becomes unusually hot, turn it off and unplug it. Overheating can lead to fire hazards if left unchecked.

2 INSTALL RESIDUAL CURRENT DEVICES

Ensure that homes and schools are equipped with Residual Current Devices (RCDs). These devices cut off the power if an electrical fault occurs, preventing electric shocks and reducing the risk of fires. RCDs should be tested regularly to ensure they are working properly. More information about RCDs is available from Electrical Safety First.

3 AVOID OVERLOADING SOCKETS

Plugging too many devices into one socket can overload the electrical system and cause a fire. In schools and homes, ensure extension leads are not overloaded and never 'daisy chain' multiple extension cords together. Educate children on the dangers of connecting too many devices to a single outlet.

4 POWER BANKS: SAFE USE

Power banks are a handy way to charge devices, but they can also pose a risk if misused. Ensure power banks are of high quality and comply with UK safety standards. Teach children never to leave power banks charging unattended, and to avoid placing them under pillows or bedding where they may overheat.

5 REGULAR DEVICE INSPECTIONS

Regularly check devices for signs of wear and tear. Frayed charging cables, cracked device casings, or devices that are slow to charge may indicate electrical problems. If any issues are noticed, stop using the device until it can be repaired or replaced by a qualified technician. This proactive approach helps prevent fires caused by faulty devices.

6 UNPLUG DEVICES WHEN NOT IN USE

Encourage children and pupils to unplug devices when not in use, particularly overnight. Devices left plugged in unnecessarily can overheat or become fire hazards, especially if left charging unattended for long periods. Simple habits like unplugging can prevent serious incidents.

7 USE GENUINE CHARGERS

Always use chargers supplied by the manufacturer or from a reputable retailer. Faulty or counterfeit chargers can cause devices to overheat, short-circuit, or even catch fire. Teach children the importance of avoiding poor-quality chargers, and regularly inspect charging cables for signs of wear or damage. More tips on safe charging can be found at Electrical Safety First.

8 WATER & ELECTRICITY DON'T MIX

Teach children that water and electricity are a dangerous combination. Devices should never be used near sinks, bathtubs, or swimming pools. Parents and educators should ensure that any electrical appliances near water sources have proper waterproof casings and are plugged into RCD-protected outlets.

9 KEEP DEVICES VENTILATED

Devices need proper ventilation to avoid overheating. Avoid stacking items on top of plugged-in devices like laptops or gaming consoles, and make sure there is enough space around devices to allow for airflow. Proper ventilation helps prevent dangerous heat build-up, reducing the risk of fires.

10 SUPERVISE YOUNG CHILDREN

Younger children may not understand the dangers of electricity, so it's important to supervise them when they are using devices. Keep electrical cords out of reach and always remind children never to put objects into electrical outlets.

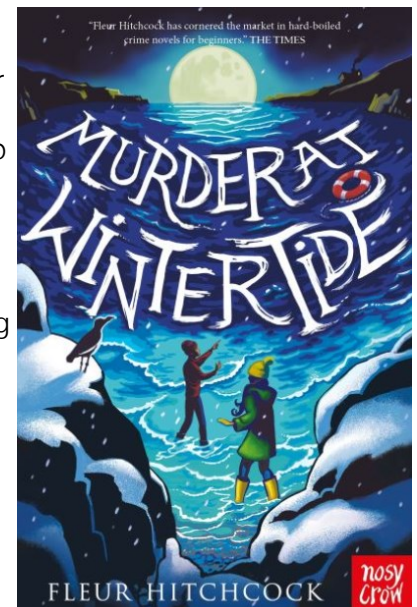
Key Stage Three

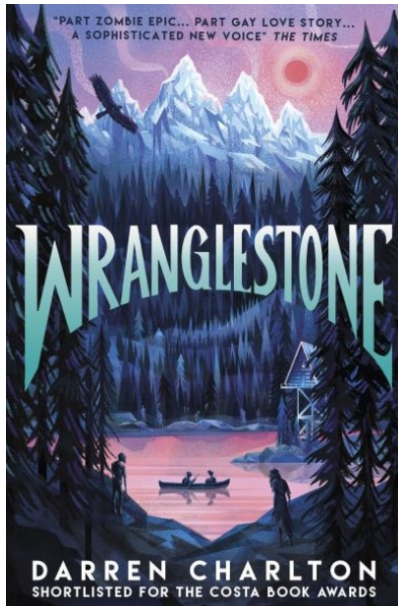
Key Stage Four
