As we welcome students, families, and staff back for the start of 2026, a renewed sense of purpose flows across Bosworth Academy.


While a new year naturally brings fresh energy, this week has reminded us that real change stems from clarity, consistency, and community. These qualities sit at the heart of our 6C values and guide the way we work together.

We began the term with high-quality teacher training to strengthen the foundations of our practice. Our first objective focused on re-establishing our vision, values, and daily habits so that every member of our community can thrive. A key element was our continued work on the 'Be Better at Bosworth' programme. This encourages us to reflect on how we support students in making positive choices, developing behaviour that truly reflects **Character, Citizenship, and Communication**.

Our second objective centred on embedding consistent routines to help close gaps and accelerate progress. Staff participated in practical workshops on checking for understanding and addressing misconceptions in learning. These sessions highlighted the importance of small, deliberate actions that help students move forward lesson by lesson. This is where **Critical Thinking** and **Collaboration** become powerful tools for success.

The third objective asked us to consider how to create an environment where all students flourish, regardless of background or need. Training on Access Arrangements and Trauma-Informed Approaches encouraged deep thinking about empathy, equity, and the conditions that help young people feel safe, valued, and ready to learn. These conversations reflect our commitment to Character and **Creativity**, recognising each child as an individual and shaping provision that supports their growth.

Our assemblies this week continued the theme of personal development. Using the concept of New Year's resolutions, we explored the three versions of ourselves: the past, the present, and the future. Students were encouraged to consider the small, daily choices that move them closer to the person they wish to become. It was a reminder that progress is not about perfection; it is about intention, reflection, and resilience.



The week ended with an unexpected challenge as Storm Goretta brought heavy snow and unsafe travel conditions. Closing the school is never a decision taken lightly. Behind the scenes, our site team arrived at 5am to assess safety. We liaised with bus companies regarding road conditions, coordinated with kitchen teams, and carefully considered the wide geographical spread of our students and staff.

Amidst the disruption, it was heartening to witness examples of Citizenship across our local communities. Social media was filled with neighbours clearing snow, moving stranded cars, and offering tea to those supporting others in the cold. These small acts of kindness remind us that community spirit remains strong. As we step into the year ahead, let us continue to embody the 6Cs in all we do and strive, together, to be better than we thought we could be.

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Be Better Programme

As mentioned in our pre-Christmas communication, we are excited to announce the launch of our new behaviour curriculum, our 'Be Better Programme' which steals its name from our core principle of everyone at Bosworth Academy striving to 'be better than you thought you could be'.



This programme is designed to help every student grow in character, resilience, and responsibility. Starting next week, the Be Better sessions will take place during tutor time every Monday morning. They will run for around 10 minutes during tutor time and the aim is to explicitly teach students our expectations in key areas as well as explaining the rationale and the 'why' behind each focus.

The foci have been identified through staff and student voice as well as using key data to also help to identify areas to focus on. The following areas will be the focus areas for the rest of the academic year:

- Be Kind: Teaching respect and kindness to each other and to staff.
- First Time, Every Time: Teaching the importance of following key instructions in a timely manner.
- One Voice at a Time: Teaching students the importance of listening and respecting others.
- Every Minute Counts: Teaching students how critical each lesson is to maximise learning.
- Taking Responsibility: Teaching the importance of learning from mistakes and accountability.
- Social Conduct: Teaching students the importance of creating a safe and respectful environment.



Each area will run for three weeks, giving students time to reflect, practice, and improve before moving



on to the next theme.

Our aim is simple: to encourage students to make positive choices and strive for excellence in all aspects of school life. To celebrate those who consistently 'do the right thing,' we will hold a weekly prize draw for students demonstrating outstanding behaviour and commitment to the programme.

We believe this initiative will strengthen our school community and help every child reach their full potential and we welcome your support in reinforcing these values at home.




Uniform Expectations

Thank you for your support in helping students meet our uniform expectations. We have made significant strides with this so far this year and we are keen to continue with this. Some key reminders are:

- Students must wear their blazers (KS4)/ jumpers (KS3) at all times, they can be taken off in lessons with permission from their teacher
- Students must wear their lanyards at all times and they should be visible at all times
- Skirts should not be rolled and they should be worn at an appropriate length. This is just above the knee (see images below)
- Trousers should not be worn below the waistline.
- Hooped earrings are not permitted
- Jewellery should be discreet including small studded earrings, max of two bracelets, two rings, one necklace and a watch
- Nose rings are not permitted. A small nose stud is permitted.
- Hair should be of a natural colour
- No false or extended nails

Bosworth Academy PE Kit

For PE, students are able to wear a plain black T-shirt as their PE top. We are also going to allow sports T-shirts with small logos. The logo must be discreet. Students may continue to wear their black Bosworth Academy branded polo shirt next year also.



Students must wear black tracksuit bottoms, black mid-thigh length shorts or black leggings.

These can also have a small, discreet, logo on them. Students will be permitted to wear a plain black hoodie or one with a small logo.

The hoodie is optional.

Branded PE kit will still be available to purchase via the school website.

PE Footwear

The reason for requiring specialist footwear is due to having a large sum of money invested in our PE facilities and the incorrect footwear can lead to early wear and tear. 'Normal' trainers flatten the surface and reduce the lifespan and 'bladed football boots' give players too much grip on the rubber crumb surface which can lead to ripping the carpet or serious injury to the player wearing the boot.

The footwear will be required at lunch and break should students be wishing to access the Dome or 3G pitch.

These boots can be picked up for £20 from Sports Direct so please do not feel pressure to buy the latest, most expensive boots.

Trainers/'Astro' trainers are needed for indoor lessons. Boots or trainers can be used on the field.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

ESSENTIAL ONLINE SAFETY

Children and young people use the internet every day to learn, play, and connect, but the online world is not always safe. For adults, it can be hard to keep up with the risks, including harmful content, cyberbullying and scams. These 10 tips provide clear and practical advice to support safer and healthier digital habits, helping young people to make informed, secure choices when using technology.

1 START EARLY CONVERSATIONS

Begin talking about online behaviour from the moment children start using devices. Use age-appropriate language and revisit topics regularly, making it clear they can speak to you about anything that upsets or confuses them. Keeping these chats open helps build trust, so children are more likely to come to you when needed.

2 PROMOTE SAFER SHARING

Children can overshare without understanding the risks. Remind them that photos, locations, or messages can be copied or shared beyond their intended audience. Explain how even private messages or group chats can be saved and/or misused. Talk about what is appropriate to post, message, and who it's safe to share with.

3 ENCOURAGE DIGITAL BALANCE

Many apps and games are designed to keep users engaged through rewards, likes, or constant updates. These features can make it hard for children to switch off. Talk openly about how these systems work and help children recognise when it's time to take a break. Building in tech-free routines supports a healthier balance and awareness of their screen time.

4 CREATE A SAFE SPACE FOR CONCERN

When children come to you with a concern, respond with interest and care, rather than with alarm. Keeping your reaction measured helps them feel safe and supported. This doesn't mean ignoring serious issues: it means showing that you're there to help. When children trust that they can speak openly, they're more likely to feel supported through unpleasant online experiences, and to ask for help in future.

5 STAY INFORMED AND CURRENT

With emerging technologies like AI moving and changing so quickly, it's important to stay updated on how children are using new platforms, apps and games. Ask them to show you what they use and let them take the lead as you explore together. This opens up valuable conversations and helps you stay ahead of emerging risks and trends.





Key Stage Three


