The past fortnight has been filled with moments that show the strength, creativity and character of our school community. World Book Day brought a wonderful sense of joy to Bosworth, with students and staff embracing the celebrations through themed lessons, imaginative costumes and activities that encouraged everyone to see reading as something fun, social and inspiring. Our library has been buzzing all week, with students choosing their free World Book Day books and taking part in reading challenges that help build a lifelong love of stories. This edition also highlights the many opportunities our students have embraced across the curriculum. Year 7 students took part in the Step Into the NHS Lab Day, exploring real laboratory techniques and discovering the wide range of careers within healthcare science. Their curiosity, teamwork and enthusiasm were clear to see. Our Year 8 students proudly showcased their Real LIFE mission work at parents' evening, demonstrating the Character, Communication and Critical Thinking that sit at the heart of our 6Cs. We are also looking forward to the GCSE Dance Show later this month, where students from GCSE Dance and the Year 7 Dance Club will take to the stage.



Alongside these successes, our parent and student surveys are now open. Your feedback is invaluable in helping us understand what is working well and where we can continue to grow. We are also reviewing our mobile phone policy in line with new national guidance. Governors will be considering the final draft shortly, ahead of a launch after the Easter break, as we work to ensure a calm, focused and safe learning environment for all students.

This week has also brought challenges. Online trends continue to spread rapidly and can have a significant impact on young people and the wider community. I know parents and carers share our concern about the risks that come with social media. Keeping children safe online is a responsibility that all adults must take seriously. I would strongly encourage families to contact their local MPs to raise the growing impact that online platforms have on young people, schools and communities. This is a topic being widely debated by politicians at the moment, and having your view represented is important.

Next Tuesday, staff from across the LiFE Multi Academy Trust will come together, many of them here at Bosworth, to share best practice and strengthen the support we offer to the 9000 students across our trust. Our early finish that day will allow colleagues to collaborate meaningfully, learn from one another and continue to improve the experience of every young person in our care. As we move further into the term, let us continue to build a culture where every student can thrive and be better than they thought they could be.

Students enjoyed a variety of activities throughout the day designed to celebrate stories and inspire reading for pleasure. Lessons across the curriculum included book-themed activities, giving students the opportunity to explore literature in different and imaginative ways.

Mobile Phone Policy

Going forward there will be an important change to our school's policy regarding mobile phones. Following the latest guidance issued by the Department for Education, and in line with our ongoing commitment to providing a safe, focused and positive learning environment, we will be introducing a new policy meaning that mobile phones will be prohibited in school after Easter.

The final draft is going to governors for ratification shortly, but our approach will broadly follow the government's requirements that *'all schools should be mobile phone-free environments by default.'* Our student leaders have played an important role in developing our new policy too.

From 1st April, students will not be permitted to use or access their mobile phones during the school day. This includes lesson time, break and lunch times, and movement between lessons. Any mobile phones brought onto the school site must be switched off and kept securely in students' bags for the entire school day.

This change has been introduced to:

- ◆ Meet the expectations set by the government
- ◆ Promote positive social interactions and reduce incidents related to online behaviour
- ◆ Support student wellbeing by limiting screen time throughout the school day
- ◆ Create a safer and more orderly learning environment

Sixth Form students will be able to use their phones in the Oaks area only.

Our policy will be that if a student is seen using their phone during the school day, the phone will be confiscated and stored safely until the end of the day. Our graduated response to repeated breaches to our policy is outlined below:

1. **First breach:** confiscation until the end of the day and a warning letter home. Student can collect.
2. **Second breach:** confiscation until parent collection. Parental meeting to be had with the relevant Head of Year.
3. **Third breach:** confiscation until parent collection at the end of the school week. Escalation to parental meeting with SLT and behaviour contract;
4. **Repeated confiscations** may also lead to a



student having to hand in their phone each day to the relevant Key Stage office indefinitely.

DfE guidance notes schools should feel confident to confiscate phones where policy is breached, and that staff are protected from liability for loss/damage when acting lawfully. The Department for Education guidance states that *'headteachers are backed by DfE to*

confiscate mobile phones and similar devices, if they consider it proportionate, for whatever length of time they deem proportionate.'

Students will be informed of the change in assemblies in the week commencing 16th March and we will be running a trial week on 23rd March where students will be expected to not have their phones out at all. During this week, they will be reminded and warned about phone use rather than follow the policy. This is to help students get ready for the new policy which will begin on 13th April.

We understand that some parents encourage their child to carry a phone for safety when travelling to and from school. Students will still be able to use their phones before arriving on site and after they leave at the end of the day.

Your support is greatly appreciated as we implement this change. Working together, we can help ensure that school remains a place where every child can learn, feel safe, and thrive.






Step Into the NHS




Masterclass Timetable

Pete will send **four** texts: one to Sarah, one to Matt, one to Amy and one to Luke. Sarah, who has already received a


text message from Pete, still needs to send **four** messages—one to each person.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

CREATIVE WAYS TO ENCOURAGE READING

Reading regularly has a life-long impact, yet recent data from the National Literacy Trust shows a decline in reading for pleasure among 8- to 18-year-olds, with just 32.7% enjoying it in 2025. Despite growing distractions, there are practical ways adults can spark a love of reading. This guide offers strategies and resources to help inspire young readers.

1 VALUE ALL READING

When we think about reading, it's very easy to picture a young person reading a fictional novel; however, reading is so much more than this. To help them understand, why not show them how to create a 24-hour reading diary? Jot down all reading and then discuss this with them. By doing this, you can demonstrate the many ways we turn to reading.

2 WIDEN THE SELECTION

Once we know reading can be varied, we need to think about the selection of reading material they can access. Visit a shop selling magazines, the library and a bookshop, and consider the range of material that is available within them. Then consider how you might broaden their reading choices, so all young people have access to a wide and varied selection.

3 GIFT A BOOK

One simple way to encourage reading is to make books feel special. Gifting a book adds value and shows it's something to be treasured. Whether it's as a reward or for a celebration like a birthday, let the young person choose a title or pick one you know they will enjoy. You could also include a personal note inside.

4 CONNECT WITH AUTHORS

Meeting authors can certainly spark an interest in their reading material. This might be through a live event in a school/bookshop or by using the wealth of online material that is now available. Encourage young people to look at ways to connect with authors using free resources such as Authorly and Just Imagine's Children's Authors Live.

5 BUILD YOUR KNOWLEDGE

Access training about reading for pleasure to widen your understanding of this topic and, more importantly, how to develop it. Explore a wide range of free resources that can be found online. The more you know, the better placed you are to inspire a love of reading in others.

6 TALK BOOKS

There are times when we need silence to read and focus on our book; however, we know that reading is a social experience, so we must also factor in discussion time. Reading the same book gives two people a connection and the opportunity to voice their thoughts and questions about it. Why not buy two copies of a book and read it together? Start the connection.

7 RECOMMENDATIONS

As well as talking about the content of books, we can share what we are reading or have read recently. This can often act as a trigger for someone else to explore it. How often have you watched a film or series because someone else has recommended it? It's the same with books. If you know the young person well, you can tailor your recommendations and share why you think they'll enjoy it.

8 GO DIGITAL

With the rise in online digital material, we can easily focus on the negatives; however, it also brings a wealth of opportunities. Resources can aid and enhance the reading experience for young people. They can read along with audiobooks, translate, and track their reading goals with resources like Polyino and apps like Goodreads for older children. Augmented reality books also bring books to life and offer a great way for engagement.

9 RECONNECT

There can come a time when a love of reading seems to disappear. It does not mean it's gone forever; it generally means they have lost the connection. How do we get it back? Find the next piece of reading material that sparks their current interests. The National Year of Reading focus of 'Go All In' captures this well as it is their key theme. As children grow and change, so do their interests. A visit to the local library is a great way to support the reconnection.

10 LEAD BY EXAMPLE

Let them see you reading. If you make time to read, you send a strong message to children: reading matters. Share why you enjoy it. Is it to relax, escape the world, learn something new or to be entertained? When children see reading as a normal and valued part of everyday life, they are more likely to adopt it themselves.

All our KS3 students were given an opportunity to pick a free World book day book, this is in addition to receiving a World book day token to use in book shop to get one of these books above.






