Throughout the day, students took part in a carousel of engaging lessons, team-building activities and school tours designed to help them feel confident and excited about joining us in September. On Tuesday 30th June and Wednesday 1st July, we welcomed families from across all Key Stages for our final Colours' Award Evenings of the year. These events are an important part of our celebration culture to recognise students for their hard work and commitment to learning. For families unable to attend, awards will be distributed via form tutors before the end of term.

On top of all this we both year 10 and 12 stepped into the world of entrepreneurship for our annual Enterprise Day. Acting as emerging tech start-ups and music company start ups, students designed innovative concepts before pitching them in final presentations.

As we go into our final week we have more to come with enriching activities and learning continuing to take place.

Our Brilliant Students Achieve Brilliant Results with the Brilliant Club.

On Tuesday, we held the final Scholars Programme tutorial with our Brilliant Club PhD Neuroscience Tutor, Mahfuza Maisha (De Montfort University). Over the last few months, our students have been working hard on a 2,000 word undergraduate-level assignment that looked into virus provision in under-developed countries. This seventh and final tutorial was an opportunity for Mahfuza to share the last feedback with students, as well as their ultimate grade.

The results were fantastic, with three students achieving First Class awards (Tighan Hunting, Myat Lwin and Sonali Pabari), six gaining 2.1s (Manaleen Batth, Elle Browne, Anna Ismahilova, Harry Lee, Maya Paz, Florence Tunnicliffe) and one student receiving a 2.2 (Maja Godziewska). A special mention goes to Lexi O'Connor for taking part. We are extremely proud of all of their achievements.

Mahfuza brought in sweets for the students and applauded their maturity and rigour when balancing this challenging project alongside the rest of their year 10 commitments and various activities and responsibilities outside school.

We are really looking forward to our visit to the University of Birmingham on Tuesday next week where the students will attend their Graduation and receive a tour of the University. Myat will be delivering a speech on her experiences on this programme.

Thank you for all the support you have given these students in achieving these outcomes which will stand them in excellent stead as they embark on the challenges ahead in Year 11.

The day culminated in high-stakes, 7-minute pitches delivered in the main hall, where our guest "Lions" questioned the teams on their market research, design choices, and business proposals. Throughout the day, students actively developed the global '6 Cs' framework, focusing heavily on Critical Thinking, Creativity, Collaboration, and Communication, providing them with fantastic, real-world examples to use in their upcoming UCAS personal statements and apprenticeship applications.

We want to extend a huge congratulations to all of Year 12 for their outstanding effort, enthusiasm, and innovation, with a special shout-out to the winning team - InterLinked who walked away with well-deserved vouchers and certificates from our Director of Careers!



Year 10 Enterprise Day Hits the Right Note!

On Monday 29th, our Year 10 students swapped the classroom for the boardroom as they took part in our exciting Enterprise Day challenge: Create, Manage and Launch a New Band.

Working in teams as music management companies, students developed every aspect of their new band, from branding and marketing to finance, business planning and operations, before pitching their ideas to a panel of judges.

The creativity on display was exceptional. Students went above and beyond expectations, producing everything from original merchandise and professional branding to entertaining music videos, complete with impressive moonwalks, heart-throb dance routines and plenty of star quality! Many groups showed outstanding teamwork, innovative thinking and excellent presentation skills throughout the day.

The standard of work was incredibly high, making the judges' decisions extremely difficult. After much deliberation, congratulations go to our winning tutor groups:

10CHY – recognised for their outstanding creativity and impressive merchandising ideas.

10CDE – recognised for their original concepts and strong social conscience, creating a band with affordability at its heart.

A huge well done to all Year 10 students for embracing the challenge with enthusiasm, professionalism and creativity. It was fantastic to see so many students demonstrating the skills of teamwork, communication, critical thinking and enterprise throughout the day.

Students Shine in Pioneering Work Experience Pilot with Mellor Bromley

Students in 8GRG and 8RMC have been taking part in a pioneering in-school work experience project in partnership with local construction and engineering firm Mellor Bromley. This pilot, designed to give students meaningful employer encounters, challenged them to work in teams to design the most effective ventilation and heating systems for a proposed new school block.

After weeks of planning and refining their ideas, the top groups travelled to Magna Park to present their pitches directly to industry specialists. Mellor Bromley representatives Zak and Pete, as well as BSS Compliance Manager (who travelled all the way from Newcastle) were genuinely blown away by the professionalism, confidence and innovation shown by every team.

The standard was so high that Zak and Pete decided to select two winning groups:

- one for Best Presentation,
- and one for Outstanding Creativity.

Both teams impressed the judges with their technical understanding, teamwork and ability to communicate complex ideas clearly.

This project marks an exciting step forward in our careers provision. As a pilot that may be replicated nationally, our students have taken part in a truly pioneering experience - one that blends curriculum learning with real-world industry practice.

We are incredibly proud of all students involved and look forward to seeing how this model can shape future careers education across the country.

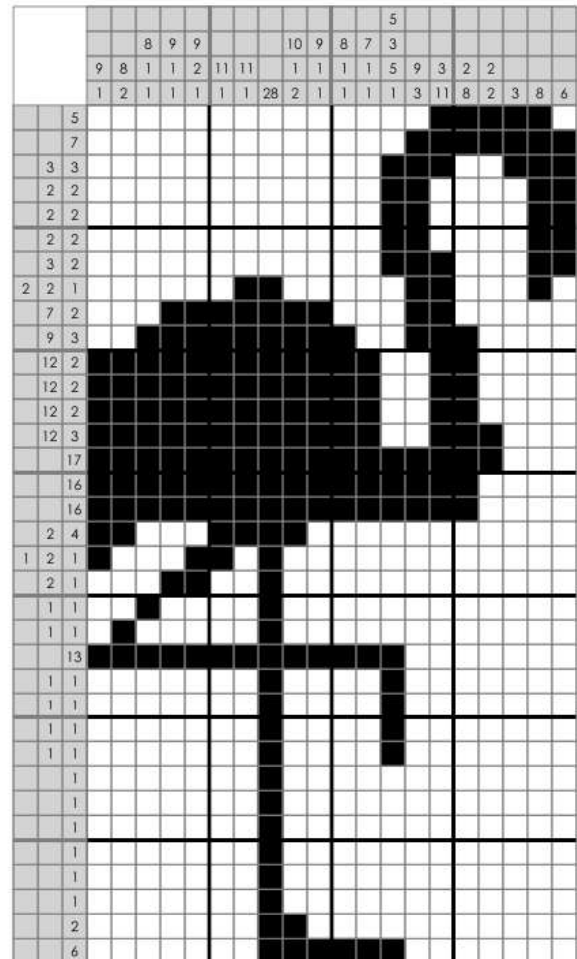
If you are either currently in receipt of Free School Meals, or if you believe you will become eligible under the new expansion (ie, you receive Universal Credit) you will need to complete an application here

10 Top Tips for Respect Online: INSPIRING CHILDREN TO BUILD A BETTER DIGITAL WORLD

Our ability to communicate with anyone in the world, at any time, via the internet has grown at breakneck speed. For teachers and parents, it can feel impossible to keep up. Worrying about our young people is understandable, and not unjustified: in 2020, for example, one in five 10- to 15-year-olds experienced bullying online. Our tips highlight ways that adults can support young people's positive online behaviours: by adopting and following 'netiquette', we can show them how to avoid getting into difficulty as they learn to negotiate the continually evolving digital landscape.

WHAT IS NETIQUETTE?

Just like etiquette is a set of rules which guides and governs our interactions with others in everyday life, netiquette – etiquette on the net – is the framework which helps inform how we communicate with people online. The rules of engagement often aren't the same as a face-to-face meeting, so it's important that we can accurately 'read' situations in the digital world and know how to act appropriately.

1 ACCEPT DIFFERENT RULES

A lot of our interaction with others is helped by non-verbal signals like body language and facial expressions. Online, of course, many of these clues are missing. Talk to your child about why this makes misunderstandings more likely to occur in the digital world and why keeping in mind that online communication is a very different process can help to prevent difficulties from arising.

2 PRESS 'PAUSE'

It's so easy to do things quickly online that most people (adults included) habitually send or respond to messages without considering the consequences. Pushing 'the pause button' buys a young person some time while they ponder the golden rule: "Would I still say this if the other person was right front of me?" You could practise this with your child on some made-up tricky situations.

3 THE INTERNET IS ADDICTIVE

Apps and sites use sophisticated algorithms and clever marketing to keep us engaged, while notifications to our devices are designed to draw us back in. It's no wonder that people continually return to the digital world, sometimes spending long periods of time there. You and your child could trial turning off notifications on certain apps and instead agree a time to check for updates manually.

4 BEWARE THE DARK SIDE

Getting a hurtful or unhelpful comment on social media or in a group chat can make the recipient feel publicly shamed. That's painful for anyone – but especially for a young person whose status in a group is integral to their sense of identity. Encourage your child to think about the best and safest way to send a message: for example, doing it as a private message rather than a public post.

5 HARMFUL INTERACTIONS

Unfortunately, it's very easy to send a hurtful message or to spread gossip and rumours online. We all know this happens regularly. Not having to deal with actually seeing the other person's distress usually doesn't help people to make a positive decision in the moment. It's important that trusted adults help children to visualise the potential consequences and have empathy for others.

6 APPRECIATE DIFFERENCES

We're all built differently; some people are simply more emotionally sensitive than others. Young people can be particularly affected by negative online communication, such as group shaming. Even a single message (which might seem trivial at face value) can cause deep anguish. Trusted adults should be prepared to be patient and listen to any difficulties their child might have had online.

7 ACCENTUATED ANXIETY

Young people's online lives create a lot of anxiety. Messages go into a 'black hole' until someone responds, there are more reasons to compare ourselves negatively, and social media can make us feel like we're missing out. Encourage activities such as sports and hobbies to balance this out, and remember that merely blocking out thoughts (by gaming, for instance) isn't the same as relaxation.

8 PRO-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

A huge positive for the internet is how it helps people to feel connected and makes being kind and helpful easy to spread. When young people get involved in pro-social behaviours online, it creates a positive feedback loop which makes them feel good. Show your child examples of when you've done or said something positive online, and praise and encourage them when they do the same.

9 BE A GOOD ROLE MODEL

One of the best things we can do as trusted adults is to role model positive online behaviour. Just letting your child see that you know when it's time to put your phone away and do something more productive can set a strong example. Some families set aside particular times of the week (such as mealtimes or a family walk) where digital devices aren't allowed and conversation takes precedence.

10 SHOW COMPASSION

Mistakes can feel much bigger online, because they're so public. If a young person does or says something regrettable on the internet, it's important to support them to forgive themselves, learn any lessons and move forward positively. Even as adults, we can often stumble when learning how things work in the fast-moving digital world, so it's important to have compassion for ourselves, too.

- What pupils need to know to be healthy and safe in school, in their personal relationships and in the wider world
